His Honor the Lieutenant Governor has been pleased to order that the Bounds of the Chatham Board of Health District be enlarged easterly to the western line of the "Irvine Property," so called, in the Parish of Chatham; and that the part of the said Parish comprised within the bounds of School Districts Nos. 1, 8 and 9. in the said Parish, enlarged easterly to the western line of the Irvine property, be set apart as and for the Chatham Board of Health District, in the County of Northumberland, under the Act of Assembly 44th Victoria, chapter 17.
