Adams, It makes out that Mr. Williston's tender for the Baie des Vents Bridge was \$3,476 and Mr. Crimmin's \$3,248-the latter being received-and charges us with lying when we stated Mr. Williston's tender for the bridge was the lowest. It is unneces sary to state, perhaps, that the bridge Mr Crimmin built was not on the site tendered for by Mr. Williston, but on the old site where the contractor was furnished with ready made pier-foundations and approaches, which Mr. Williston tendered to build. The Advocate may not be aware of this fact, but that does not render it les amenable to the decency of public journalism for the charges of untruth it prefers against this paper. Mr. Adams did not furnish us with the figures of the tenders. as he has done the Advocate, which makes great outcry because we referred to the bridge as involving a cost of 'four or five thousand dollars of public money." #### Where the Money Goes.

Hon, Wm. Lindsay of the Legislative founcil showed up the extravagance of the New Brunswick Government to good effect in the recent debate on the Assembly's bill for the abolition of that ancient and honorable body. The whole debate is issued in the form of an extra by the

Telegraph, and it is interesting reading. Mr. Lindsay said :--They pretend to say that the finances of this country require that the expenses should be curtailed, and the way they are going to save the money, is to abolish us. Yes. That is the way they are going to save \$10,000 a year to spend on our roads and bridges. It will be very little the roads or the bridges will get. You never hear one of them say, that their own expenses are too much. You never hear one of them say they will begin with themselves and reduce their own salaries, or that they will reduce the expenses of the departments. Oh, no. Last year, on the 25th Oct., they drew in advance \$60,000 on the subsidy on which they paid interest until Jan., at which time they were entitled by law to draw the money. In addition to that they paid \$750 interest to the People's Bank. The expenses of the Executive Government in 1870 were \$21,770. Last year they were \$36,720, making an increase in the ten years of \$14,950. That is not bad. No wonder they want to take the head off somebody.
