

M. Gaston Tisandier's little balloon at the Paris Electrical Exhibition has attracted much attention. The balloon is of an elonged egg-shape, with conical ends, measures eleven and one-half feet in length and four and one-quarter feet in diameter, and has a lifting power of a little more than four pounds. It is driven to and fro across the Palais de l'Industrie by a Trouve electric motor weighing less than half a pound, which in weight. M. Tisandier has made OYSTERS served at short notice in all the some interesting calculations from the results of experiments with this tiny aerostat. He finds that an electric motor developing six horse power could be made with a weight of 660 pounds, with 1980 pounds of battery. It would

be easy to raise this by an elongated balloon of 106,000 cubic feet capacity filled with hydrogen. Such a balloon would be 131 feet long and 44 feet in diameter in the middle, and would have an ascensional force of 7,700 pounds. Deducting weight of balloon, motor and battery, 2,200 pounds would be left for passengers and ballast. In calm weather such an air-ship should have a speed of twelve to fifteen miles an hour, and in currents its direction could be directed to some extent. The battery power, however, would last but a short time, so that a balloon constructed on this plan would evidently be valuable only for purposes of experiment; while this estimate makes it quite apparent that the motor described would, in the somewhat improbable event of the practical application of power to balloons, be found much less economical than steam.

American ships from the seas, the English are making announcements of the greatest activity in this line of industry. Before the beginning of another year, five magnicent passenger steamers of the largest size, and hitherto unparalleled power, will have been added to the mercantile navy of Great Britain. Since the first of the month the City of Rome, latest born daughter of the Inman, left the mouth of the Clyde on her trial trip, and later on the Clyde. Both these vessels belong to the fleet of the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation company. The Alaska is advertised to make her first trip, from Liverpool to New York, on the 22nd of this month. She is the big sister of the Arizona and promises to be the brightest ornament of the Guion line. On the first of last March, the leviathan of the aunched at Clydebank, close to Glascow. It was intended that the Servia should have sailed upon her first voyage, from Liverpool to New York, on the 13th of August, but an accident to her shaft has made it necessary for her to be sent back to the Clyde, and her first transatlantic trip will not take place before November. The Alaska, the shortest of the three rivals, is not less than 500 feet in length, while the Servia is 530 feet long, and the City of Rome is 586 feet in length.
