

Out of 102,831 individuals who have passed the age of ninety, only 42,528 are men, and 60, 303 are women. He also finds that there are but 141 male centenarians to 241 women who have reached a hundred

years of age.

The attempts to explain the tails of comets have been various. A new effort to solve the problem has been made by M. Picart, as follows: The sun, the stars, nebulae and comets, are composed not only of ponderable matter in the gaseous state, but of imponderable matter-the "luminous ether -revealed, in the case of the sun, by the zodiacal light, and in that nebulae, by their irregular forms contrary to gravitation. A comet far from the sun, appears in spheroidal form due to gravitation of its ponderable matter-its luminous ether being then invisible because of its distance and feeble light. But on nearing the sun, repulsion being a characteristic property of luminous ether, the ether of the sun repels that of the comet, and thus forms the tail. The form and direction of the tail are thus quite independent of gravitation; and the comet's enormous velocity ceases to be a difficulty, as it is in theories which suppose the matter of the tail to be ponderable. This explanation may account for the comets' tails, but the mystery of the ham, N. B.

An official publication of the German post office contains a report on the disturbances in telegraphic communication caused last August by a display of the aurora borealis. It is well known that both storms and the aurora borealis disturb the electric currents passing over telegraphic cables, but recent experience seems to prove that the disturbing influence of storms chiefly affects short lines, while the longer lines are more liable to be affected by the northern lights. There was a strong disturbance of the latter kind from the 11th to the 14th of August, 1880. It of speaking was perfectly restored. seems to have manifested itself throughout the greater portion of the northern section of the eastern hemisphere, sending off, however, a southerly stream in the direction of Mozambique, which reached to Natal.
