



Fatal Railway Accident.

On Tuesday morning [of last week,] the regular Bangor express, leaving Carleton at 8.30 a. m., collided with a rail train near Fairville, on the St John and Maine Railway. The express was in charge of David Brown, conductor, with Daniel Mc Donald, driver, and Edward Wheaton. fireman. Conductor Coram was on the freight train with W. A. Buchanan, driver. and Wellington Rickers, fireman. Mc Donald and Rickers were injured, the latter so badly that he died on Thursday Attached to the express was a number of cars containing picnicers to Westfield Had the cars left the irons at the time of the collision it is almost sure that some of them would have tumbled down an em bankment, and it is almost fearful to contemplate the loss of life that would have then taken place. Both locomotives were demolished and a number of cars were shattered. It is clear that the Conductor and driver neglected their order to cross the rail train at Fairville. The Conductor had received the order where to place the pic-nicers at Westfield, but stated that he was considerably bothered about the pic-nic party, as he did not know the exact place to put them down, The fireman of the express broke one of his fingers before reaching Fairville, and this also it is stated bothered the Conductor. At all events, the crossing order was neglected, by both conductor and driver, and in consequence the accident occurred The damage amounts to about \$7,000 Conductor Brown has many sympathisers over his mistake, as he has been, hitherto. known to be a careful and courteous official. - Freeman.

Shocking Accident at Bird Rocks.

A New York Herald despatch of 15th inst. via Quebec says:-Intimation has reached the Quebec agency of the Dominion Department of Marine and Fisheries to night of a most harrowing accident, which occurred at Bird Rocks, Gulf of St. Lawrence, on Saturday. Bird Rocks are directly in the line of sailing vessels from England to Quebec and Montreal, and midway between Anticosti, Newfoundlard, and Cape Breton. On account of their dangerous character to shipping, a large fog gun is stationed on the Island and fired at short intervals. A cable from Grosse Isle. Magdalen Islands, sixteen miles from Bird Rock was received by Mr. Gregory, the Quebec agent of the Marine Department, to-day, vaguely stating that the keeper of the station, his son and assistant were killed by the explosion. Mr Gregory immediately issued an official notice to navigators that owing to the explosion no more signals could be given to shipping from Bird Rock until a a new gun could be sent down.
