

compensation for the damages caused them by what has been called the Fortune Bay outrage. The Americans themselves must be astonished. The facts, as stated by the British Government after an official enquiry, are that some American fishermen followed a school of herring into Fortune Bay, N. F., on a Sunday, and proceeded to fasten their nets to the shore so as to enclose nearly all the fish. They had no right so to use the shore, and the local law, passed long before we believe, forbade fishing on Sunday. This law was applicable to Americans fishing within the three mile line as well as to the fishermen of Newfoundland. The fishermen of Fortune Bay, indignant at seeing the law so openly and grossly violated, and the Americans doing, with prospect of immunity, what they were not permitted to do. tore the nets from the shore, and otherwise injured them and allowed the fish to escape. The Americans at first contended that their fishermen were not subject to the local law, but this ground was wholly untenable. It could not be denied. however, that a mere mob should not take the law into their own hands, as the people of Fortune Bay did, and that the destruction of the nets by a crowd or mob was not the enforcement of a legal penalty for the crime of fishing on Sunday.
