

Fans are often mentioned in Latin authors. Plautus refers to the flabeliferrae or female slaves, who carried parasols and fans to shade and drive away flies from then mistresses. Fans of peacock's feathers remained in fashion through the middle ages up to the seventeenth century, no only in Italy but in England and France. Fans of ostrich feathers came into favor gradually, excluding those of peacock feathers, and such fans appear in Titian's pictures. Leaves of palmtrees reeds and odoriferous woods are among the substances of which fans are

now made in foreign countries. A late scientific writer defines instinct as "nothing else than an obscurremembrance of experiences which were made by earlier generations. clear remembrance which extends over the boundaries of our indvidual life has, it is true, not yet been found among men, but this does not prove anything against the above assertion. Such a remembrance we do no possess even for the complete period of our present life. Our memory does not extend back to the first years of our infancy. It is interrupted by sleep; it may be strengthened by exercise or wakened by neglect; it may be interrupted by many abnormal states by which life itself is not interrupted. Whether in dreams, or in conditions of abnormalnervous excitement in hysterics or other sickness memory is increased, so that it really extends over the period of our so-called individual life, is a question which, although much abused by humbugs and imposters, might still arrest the attention whether the memory of man has such an extension, and though even tor the human race the contrary may be proven, it, nevertheless, might be spossible that some animals are endowed with a memory which reaches far beyond their so-called individual exist-

Gymnastics and the Bath. A physician writes to the New York Times: For years past I have been cor.

inced that the mania for gymnastic

exercises, athletic development and muscular power has been productive of a vast deal of harm. Years ago the theory in vogue for gaining health was dieting, and hundreds of people dieted themselves into insanity or the grave. Now the mania is or exercise, and hundreds of young men. and (although it may seem to be a ridiculous statement) young women are also killing themselves with "exercise." Nature rebels at "knotted" muscles, and requires the full payment of a serious penalty whenever the folly is perpetrated of developing muscle as a business, through the swinging dumb-bells and Indian clubs. The long walks, which are taken too frequently and with quite too much vim, under the influence of a spirit of emulation or to win a bet, are productive of far nore injury than benefit. But, most of all, I wanted to call the attention to the idea of daily bathing. The poor body is literally scrubbed out of existence. Nature guards her outposts very jealously, but she can net do double duty in one direction with. out signal failure in some other. Connoise being produced by the scraping of sequently, when the surface of the body the horny apex of the abdomen three is daily denuded of the cuticle under the vigorous application of the barbarous times in rapid succession against the dry "coarse towel," she must repair damages at the expense of the digestion or the natural elimination of morbid matter: some organ loses the harmony with its tellows which is necessary to a perfect whole. Cleanliness is not only "next to godliness," but a very large part of it, and it is highly important that bathing should be employed as a hygienic force: but not the shower bath when an exhausted body is slowly waking from an unnatural sleep; not a cold soonge when the day's duties have exhausted loth mi d and bedy .-To change the clothing frequently and permit a thorough airing, to expose he entire surface of the body for a few minutes to the air of the room on rising and retiring, a light brushing with a soft brush or a fine towel, and a good bathonce or twice a week are all that an American can endure and retain health. Light exercise of those musc'es not called into play in the daily ilso desirable, but it should be calisthenic, not gymnastic, and should not include a vigorous pounding of the

chest, than which nothing can be worse for The exercise which a light heart and a 'ear conscience will require of men and women, will generally be found to answer all the needs of good health. If the system is enervated by excesses and deranged by the use of stimulants, the will may be needed to rouse the body to motion. If over-work has caused the relaxation, surely our wisest teacher is nature, when she draws the poor body irresistibly to the couch and beneficiently closes the weary eves to the infatuation of dumb bells and the paraphernalia of the Indian-club map.

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
