

They Are Prepared. Do any of our rural friends remember the time (just after they first set up housekeeping) when they paid ten dollars to the wandering picture-dealer for a gorgeously-framed "genuine oil-painting,"

destined to the place of honor in the new That "genuine oil-painting" (technically termed a buckeye) was perhaps one of a lot of five thousand, though designated "No 87-Scene on Lake George." It was issued from a certain manufactory, the first floor of which is given up to preparing "canvas" -cotton cloth, smeared with glue and whiting, and placed on "stretchers" made upon the spot by machinery. The second floor is devoted to frames. which are gaudy shells of wood, covered with a material called "Dutch gilt," resembling gold leaf, but containing no particle of gold. The third floor is occupied by the "studio." Here stand lines of of paint splashed girls, who, by means of a species of stencils, which they use with great facility, sketch in the outliness of figures and landscapes. These are then passed to a more advanced painter, who completes the picture with two or three effective touches. It is then varnished dried, and stacked in a bin with hundreds of others, until it is framed for the market. A dozen of these pictures, twenty-two by twenty-six inches, framed and boxed,
