

But it is only a question of time-the lapse of which will depend upon the nature of the subsoil-how long or short a time will elapse before the poison pours undiluted into the well, and from it into the stomachs of the unfortunate and unsuspecting victims. If a bed of clay lies close to the bottom of the cesspool, there will be no escape downward, and the period required to reach the well will be probably six months. If the soil is gravelly and the waste sinks downward, there is the absolute certainty that a stream of water which flows into the well will be reached sooner or later.
