shown why the limits should be extended A number of years ago a small boom was formed on the present site and afterwards went down four miles. Four years ago they were given the right to extend their limits, so they now have seven miles on the river, which is more than they require. The bill would give the Company the exclusive right to raft in the extension, though they have not it now in the extend ed limits. The people on Renous River would be completely shut out from rafting a log anywhere. The present boom limits are sufficient to contain all the logs that

will come down at one time.

Mr. Hutchison said that the Company were bound to keep their boom in the river till the 1st of October, and after that they take up the boom unless there are logs in the river. When the dri came down last year late in October Lessee of the Boom gave notice to the parties having drives in the river and did nothing unfair. The extension of the Boom limits would not interfere with fishing privileges, as stated in one of the petitions. but the extension will on the other hand stop all the side booms along the river river which do interfere with fishing. The small lots of lumber are invariably rafted at the landings. The Company have expended from \$30,000 to \$40,000 on their booms. They have been induced by the lumberers to put a boom there and should have protection in order to afford the larger operators that confidence they should have met. The amount rafted out. side the boom is increasing from year to

year, and the Boom provides perfect safety

for what is rafted above, so that the pro-

tection is absolutely necessary.

Hon. Mr. Adams said he would direct the attention of the committee to the fact that Boom is now kept across the river and that was, of itself, sufficient to prevent a further extension. His experience had been that the Company had not kept men at the Sheer Boom to keep the navigation open. The river, had been blocked week in and week out and the poor men could not get down to the bark factory with make the Lessee keep the Boom open after October; whereas it should be kept open to November 1st, and for two years under the present Lessee's management, the boom has not been taken up till after November. and if any one's lumber is hung up till after the 1st day of October, the Lessee's terms have to be agreed to, or he can let the lumber go where he thinks fit. The reason a large amount is rafted outside is owing to the mismanagement of the Company itself. If the limits were extended the operators on the Renous river would have to pay more than their contracts would warrant. A mile and a half of the present limits are not utilized now in consequence of the disputes that have arisen in past times. A provision should be put in any new bill that would impose a penalty on the Company or Lessee for every day the river is blocked. The fair way for the Boom Company to act would be to prepare a bill that would wipe out all the old disputes. The unmarked logs should be divided among the parties who own the timber. If it suits the convenience of the Lessee he can mix up one man's logs with another and so raft them Under the present charter the way of
