

The Journal de Physique-long edited by M. d'Almeida, lately deceased—narrates this interesting episode: During the investment and siege of Paris by the German armies in 1870 71 M. d'Almeida took a prominent part in certain attempts to reestablish telegraphic communication between Paris and the provinces, using the River Seine as a conductor. This suggestion originated with M. Bourbouze (of galvanometer fame), who was, after the war, created a chevalier for his suggestion. It was proposed to send powerful currents into the River Seine from batteries at the nearest available point outside the German lines, and to receive in Paris, by delicate galvanometers, from the river such a portion of these currents as might not have leaked into the earth. After some preliminary experiments, it was decided to make the attempt, and accordingly on Dec. 17, 1870, M. d'Almeida was despatched by balloon to the provinces in order to try to establish this novel mode of telegraphy without wires.
