### County Court.

Northumberland County Court is still in session at Newcastle, the whole sitting having been mainly occupied with trying the charges of forgery against Anthony Perry, a worthless vagabond who is causing the County to be at no little expense on account of his rascalities. The Court opened on Tuesday of last week and the following were sworn as Grand Jurors :-D. G. Smith, Foreman.

His Honor, Judge Wilkinson, in ad dressing the Grand Jury, expressed his pleasure in seeing so many familiar faces among them. This was the first court held by him in this County since his appointment, at which there was a grand jury, there having been none the previous term, owing to there being no criminal business claiming the Court's attention. Looking back in life, periods when new starts in the journey are made are occasions that give interest to man's existence, marking the passage of time and causing him to realise how it cheats his senses. His appointment had brought to his recollection his coming to this County in 1840. The first man to whom he spoke was the present High Sherriff, who kindly showed him the house of his brother. The forty years that had intervened between that time and the present had brought with them many changes and the results were truly surprising. Of all the persons then doing business in Chatham, Newcastle or Douglastown he did not think

one was still in active business life. Hon. Mr. Hutchison the able and respected representative of the firm of Gilmour, Rankin, & Co. was in his early vigor, but had not then become a partner in the concern. Of the professional men of that time in the Miramichi, but one was now practicing. The senior member of the Bar in this County-Richard Carman, Esq. -was then practicing at Bathurst and the only other member was the respected Judge Williston now retired. A. A. Davidson, Esq. was not then, he thought, enrolled. Of the medical men of the time only one, Dr Thomson, of Chatham, but then of Newcastle, still remained in practice. The same change was observable in the Ministry, not one of the clergymen then doing their Master's work, according to their several views, being still in active service, save the Very Rev. 
