# The Tables Turning.

Our Fredericton correspondent tele graphed last night :-- "Judge Steadman, Henry Phair, Esq., Clerk Assistant of the Legislative Council, and Edgar Hanson Esq., of the Provincial Civil Service, have each commenced an action against Fishery Inspector Venning for interfering with their rights to fish on the Miramichi as iparian owners, and prosecuting them in Justices' Courts here a short time ago. The necessary documents for entering the suits have already been filed in the Clerk of the Pleas' office. The damages in each case are set at \$5,000. In the case of Mr. Phair damages for assault are included in the claim, Mr. Venning having, it i alleged, laid hold of the plaintiff and presented a revolver at his person."-Sun of 7th inst.


The notoriety that Inspector Venning has gained in connection with his at tacks upon and ill-treatment of riparian owners, together with the execration in which he is held by fishermen generally, for the persecuting spirit in which he has dealt with their interests, seem now to be the chief features of his official It is probable that if Mr. Spurr, whom he robbed of property and assault ed at Pabineau Falls in June last, were to enter an action against him, he would deem it another mark of distinction. because his moral sensibilities appear to be quite blunted and the Dominion Government would be compelled to pay any damages that might be awarded against him. Those who control the Fisheries Department are directly responsible to Parliament for their acts, and it ought at once to be ascertained by members of both sides, how far the reckless policy of incurring great law expenses and attacking the persons and private rights of citizens of the Dominion, is to be carried under the impertinent and ignorant pretext of "regulating the fisheries."
