There, they first learn the Sabbath, morning and evening; and also equality of man. If they did not, it was no reason why we should continue it for "half a loaf is better than no bread" and by not taking the half when we cannot get the whole loaf, we only cut off our nose to spite our face. It is our duty to show the United States a better example.


