



In the year 1870,-three years at ter Confederation-when the present Executive may be said to have first come into power, the cost of adminis tering the Government was, in round numbers, \$64,000. In 1880 it was \$105,000 !! When it is remembered

from all sources for the last year was \$675,000 it will be realized that the management must have been very reckless when it absorbed so large a proportion of the revenue. In the item of interest for debt contracted mainly because of the Government's efforts to hold itself together, there has been an alarming increase. Under this head we paid in 1870 only \$4,508.
