



Some of the remedies adopted by modern medical science are peculiar. Tuchsine-a bright anilne dye-was, not long since, recommended in Bright's disease, and now the use of nitroglycerine in minute dose is advised for

certain chest affections. The degree of heat necessary to destroy trichinae in pork is a matter of importance as a safeguard against trichnosis. A German microscopist states that only the most thorough cooking of the meat will ensure perfect safety, as pork cooked to the degree known as 'rare' may still contain the living

parasites so much dreaded. A French electrician, M. Gaiffe, has investigated the peculiar sounds which interfere with messages sent on telephone lines. He finds that the sounds are largely due to the vibration of the telephone wires by the wind. The sounds are doubtless often produced by the inductive action of electric currents passing over neighboring telegraph prepared, as one of the wires: but this is far from being the only cause, as has been generally be-

> A recent publication of the Brussels Observatory states that there are at pre sent 118 public astronomical observatories in full activity, viz. : 84 in Europe, 2 in Asia, 2 in Africa, 3 in Oceanica and 27 in North and South America. The United States has 19; Mexico, 2; Brazil, Chili, Columbia, Equador, the Argentine Republic and New Britain, 1 each. In Europe, Prussia contains the largest number, 29; England has 14; Russia, 12; Italy, 9; Austria, 6 France, 6; Switzerland, 4; Sweden, 3; Holland, Norway and Portugal, 2 each; Belgium, Greece, and Denmark, 1 each. The oldest observatory now in operation is that of Leyden,

established in America since 1870. The following curious optical illusion has been described by Dr. Candeze, of Liege. Take a sheet of paper eight or ten inches in length, and having rolled it into a tube, apply it to the right eye with the left hand. Keep both eyes open, and look at an object a few yards off, say a small statuette. It will appear that the right eye, imprisoned by the paper tube, does not see the object; but that the left eye alone perceives it, and seems to distinguish it through an orifice open in the left hand. The left hand holding the cylinder appears very distinctly perforated. Another very interesting experiment consists in holding the paper tube with the right hand, and applying with the left to its exterior surface, a small square of paper, in the middle of which is drawn a dark circle; the latter will have the appearance of being sus-

founded in 1632. Six observatories of

pended interiorly in the centre of the cylinder. A German naturalist has contrasted the behavior of different animals towards steam machinery. There is not, probably, an extensive reader of English books living who has not heard something of the curious fortunes that befell the manuscript of Waverly before Sir Walter Scott was finally the most perfect equipment have been persuaded to give it to his publisher. In the first place, the story was commenced, and carried through a number of chapters -I think he had got his hero into the mountain cavern of the Highland Robber, Donald Bean Lean-and then thrown aside. Afterwards the author, while overhauling an old desk, in search of fishing tackle, came across those opening chapters of his story, and fished them out, thinking he would read the Ms. over, and see what he had written. He did so ; and, as a result, finished writing the

But even then he did not offer it for publication. He believed his poetry was good-or, at all events, he knew the Scotch people liked it, and that the English speaking people everywhere spoke well of it; but he had no faith in his ability to write a story. As he said once to a friend: "I thought as I read it (Waverly) over, that it might do to tell to a gathering of children, but it would never answer to put into a book for grownup men and women." And he went on, from 1805 to 1814, writing poetry, leaving the forgotten manuscript of Waverly to

the mice and moths. Many have known all this; but very few, perhaps, are aware of how near to losing that charming story the world once came. on a certain autumnal day a party of sportsmen, whom Sir Walter was entertaining, being all ready to start for the forest, found themselves minus wadding for their fowling-pieces, whereupon the host rushed up into his loft, threw open a desk where he knew there was worthless paper, a d took up half this neglected manuscript, and gave it to the leader of the expedition. And, on that day, Waverly would have been blown into fire and snicke, had not Sir Walter's friend suggested that a paper not quite so stiff and unyielding would make better wadding, whereupon the MS. was thrown back, and

a more pliable paper found. Such were some of the fortunes of the manuscript of a story which was to literally startle the world, and give it joy. It opened a new era in story-telling. People found it refreshing to take to their firesides a story which they could read without a blush; and that very simplicity which its author had so much dreaded was to prove its greatest charm and recommendation.
