"Advance" Scientific Miscellany. Copper has been detected in the soil of a churchyard, and in portions of exhausted bodies.

A new scientific instrument is the "pneumometer," which registers the quantity of rain falling within a certain period, and the duration and hour of the fall.

Mr. W. N. Lockington states that of three hundred and eight species of fishes, mostly marine, occurring on the Pacific coast, all but thirty-seven are found in California.

It has recently been discovered that a minute fungus will cause fermentation in a solution of glucose, while it does not affect that of cane sugar.

A medical missionary has learned the curious fact that Mongol doctors are not entirely unacquainted with the properties of galvanism.

The researches of Prof. Quincke indicate that the change of volume of solid and liquid bodies under electrical influence is not due to heat.

A new method of producing light from electricity has been patented in England. Small balls of platinum or iridium are arranged at the ends of small platinum rods.

If elastic gum is warmed, then expanded and wound in a spiral upon a glass tube or wire and cooled for a short time in a cooling mixture, it shows no tendency to contract.

It was asserted that this contract was better than that submitted by Mr. Mackenzie. Under the Act of 1874 the provisions submitted by the member for Lambton were not so binding as those, which were to be accepted as they stood.

The standard of the railway was a matter of great importance, because between 1869 and 1874 the Union Pacific had spent ten millions to make their road safe for passengers, and if this road was to be a good road it must be superior to the quality of the Union Pacific Railroad in 1869.

The quality of the road was to be determined by the Governor in Council, and the Company had not a word to say in the matter. They were not, as now proposed, made the sole judges of the standard.

Parliament reassembled at Ottawa on Tuesday last, and the Government secretly decided on this contract, and then asked the House to accept its word that this was the best contract that could be made.

The House again went into committee on the resolution of Sir Charles Tupper granting and appropriating \$25,000,000 of land in the North-West Territories, according to the terms of the contract relating to the Canadian Pacific Railway transmitted to the House by the Governor-General by the message of Dec. 10.

Mr. Cameron (Huron) said he had listened with care to the speeches on this question, and had marked particularly the utterances of the hon. Minister of Railways, both inside and outside of the House.

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
