



In the British colleries numerous experiments have been made to determine the cause of explosions in the mines, and these results are now accepted as correct by most of the experimenters: 1. Explosions are usually caused by the presence of coaldust in air containing a small amount of true fire-damp, the Davy lamps serving to detect the presence of dangerous gases when in sufficient quantity to alone cause explosion. 2. Mixtures of coal-dust and air without firedamp are not explosive. The researches have shown that air containing no more than two per cent of fire-damp (a quantity so small as to escape notice) is un safe in the presence of coal-dust.

Carica papaya, or papaw-tree, which grows in the Moluccas, in India, in the Antilles and in South America. Its chief property is a remarkable digestive power, acting, like the gastric fluid of the stomach, upon meats and various other substances. It is proposed by M. E. Bouchut that papaine be used for dissolving the false membranes of diphtheria. In his experiments, a thick and resisting false membrane from the trachea, placed in a tube with a third part of papaw juice, was dissolved in a few hours when cold, and in a few minutes when the tube was warmed. Since beginning his investigations of the subject, he has employed the substance in the treatment of thirtytwo cases of diphtheria of adults and infants, and has been successful in all
