

this Guiteau shouted excitedly : "I don't care if you do ; the Court en banc will reverse you, and I will get a new trial. You have "got no right to remove me."

The Judge replied : "Very well,] shall do so if you persist in any more disturbance and there are precedents in this court for such ruling." A whispered consultation between Guiteau and Scoville followed, and the former, apparently convinced, submitted in absolute quiet and devoted himself to his papers.

District Attorney Corkhill then offered in evidence certain letters which yesterday were read to Mr. Blaine and identified by him.

Patrick Kearney, the policeman who arrested Guiteau, described minutely the arrival of the President's carriage and corroborated Secretary Blaine's testimony as to the murder by the prisoner. The witness admitted that Guiteau did not attempt to run away, Guiteau nodded his head from time to time during Kearney's testimony as though he approved of what was said, especially the evidence of his quiet behavior and want of resistance after the shooting. Other witnesses testified to seeing Guiteau before the shooting, and that nothing was noticed which would indicate his insanity.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19th. The work of taking evidence proceeded to-day with no incident of unusual interest. This afternoon, however, as Guiteau was being conveyed from the court room to jail in a covered van, a person on horseback rode up to the side, and after peering through the grating to satisfy himself as to Guiteau's position, suddenly fired two shots through the side of the vehicle. He then put spurs to his horse and rode away at a furious pace. One shot was harmless. The other inflicted a slight wound in Guiteau's hand. The prisoner was nearly overcome with fear, but was hurried to prison. During the evening a man named William Jones, a farmer, living in the outskirts of the city, was arrested as the person who fired the shots. He is an eccentric individual who is well known to the police. To-day one of the guards who was accompanying the van, and who fired at the assailant, positively failed to identify Jones and states that he is not the man. Various rumors are in circulation in the eastern part of the city regarding attempts which will be made to shoot Guiteau. Many persons believe that concerted action with that result in view has been taken since the trial com-
