The Smallwood Correspondence NEWCASTLE, Dec. 13th, 1881 To the Editor of the Miramichi Advance. SIR :- In my present letter to the public I shall not only show the shameful way in which we have been neglected by our Councillors, but also touch upon other matters affecting our best interests. Our Councillors, instead of using vigorous measures to combat the laxity of affairs which exist, are either not able or willing to grapple with them. Our jail is in a wretched condition, being neither well ventilated nor supplied with proper fuel. The officer of it, however, faithfully discharges his duties, but is somewhat restricted in those duties by a too economical committee. The dangerous condition of our public wharf during especially the summer months, should have called for immediate action. To see people having to step from a steamer to a wharf partly composed of very decayed planks and then to make their way to town without sufficient lamplight, showed culpable negligence on the part of the same Board. I may here state that about \$225 are received by the Sec'y-Treasurer on account of wharfage rent. The wharf at Bushville and the landings at Nelson and Indiantown are also very inconvenient for our steamers and, as a consequence, our enterprising citizen, R. R. Call, Esq., suffers somewhat in public patronage. Onr town too is not sufficiently lighted, thereby giving loafers a chance of nightly insulting respectable people, and also depriving our Police Officer in detecting on dark nights who the loafers are. A stranger remarked to me that he was surprised that a town of the extent and population of Newcastle should not be better lighted and said if through that he met with an accident he would sue the proper body. To rectify this wretched state of affairs which exists. requires councillors who readily perceive the wants of our community, fearlessly do their duty and are not easily discouraged when success does not at once crown their efforts. In conclusion I may state that a lawyer of ability has strongly urged me to take action against that Councillor who was unqualified on account of holding a Retail License under his son's name, aged about sixteen.
