The Horrors of a Sleepless Night

(From "Isolanth") When you're lying awake with a tinnal headache, and repose is without with anxiety.

I conceive you may use any language you choose to indulge in without impropriety: For your brain is on fire, the bedclothes conspire of usual slumber to plunder you.

Then the bedclothes all creep to the ground in a heap, and you pick 'em all up in a tangle. Next your pillow rises, and you tumble and toss till there's nothing 'twixt you and the ticking.

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Shadows of the Cemetery.

A couple of days ago. The two young men were said to be medical students from Jefferson College, and reflection on their remarks led to the fear that "Jim" had found on a dissecting table a subsequent resting place to that provided him in Lebanon Cemetery.

By an ingenious system of investigation it was learned that as far back as twenty years ago an old man, now dead, procured bodies from Lebanon Cemetery for medical colleges, their transportation being managed by a public carrier, whose stand for years was at Tenth and Market streets.

When he died his successor was found in John Meyer, who kept a saloon at the southwest corner of Tenth and Sanson streets. Meyer did the hauling of several loads of corpses, and then had a dispute with the demonstrator of anatomy concerning remuneration. He threatened exposure, but the dispute was settled and Meyer quitted the business and until recently was proprietor of a beer saloon at No. 1,323 Germainton avenue. Now he is a bar-tender in New York. While on Germainton avenue two reporters, who palmed themselves off as doctors, obtained the story of his connection with the work, and also the admission that the present restorations were the three people whose names are mentioned in the warrant and who were captured last night. He also told the reporters that Levy Chew's brother was the superintendent of the graveyard down town, and that he (Chew's brother) knew all about the resurrection business, but did not take any active part in it.

SHADOWS OF THE CEMETERY. On the information thus obtained an elaborate investigation was inaugurated, and the plans for the exposure completed last night. The amateur detectives had been steadily working since "Jim" Wick's death, and the unguarded remark dropped by the student in Dooner's, led to speculation and subsequent investigation. Reporters shadowed the graveyard; McNamee's stables, at No. 924 Sanson street; the saloons in the neighborhood of the college, No. 933 Lembari street, the residence of a colored undertaker by whom Levy is ordinarily employed, and other places where it was likely important testimony pointing toward the complexity of the parties mentioned could be obtained.

As far back as March and April last, sufficient had been learned to establish the guilt of these parties, but shortly after the sessions of the college ceased, and it was decided to suspend proceedings for a time, so that the climax could be reached when the ghastly work was resumed with the reassembling of the college. This occurred some time ago, and the investigation was recommenced. It disclosed the fact that the demand for dead bodies had also begun again, and that the same parties were engaged in the horrible business.

THE CAPTURE. The culmination was reached last night. The men, shadowing McNamee's stable, saw a wagon drive out and away down town. The word was passed to others in waiting, and five reporters, Mr. Megargee and Detective Henderson, jumped into a couple of carriages in waiting and rode to Passayunk Road and Broad street. At Passayunk Road and Broad street, at a couple of o'clock this point was reached and the party walked to the avenue. They were all armed with revolvers, and after a short time separated in two parties of three one on each side of the roadway. A wagon drove out of the cemetery and dashed down the roadway. The leader of the investigators stepped into the middle of the street and cried to the driver: "Hold on! I want to see you."

"Peering into the wagon, which pulled up, he saw the dusky features of Levy Chew, and leveling a pistol at the three men he commanded them to drop the lines or he would shoot. In the meantime his companions had gathered round the wagon, each with his pistol pointed at the occupants. They saw themselves completely hemmed in and surrounded. Pallet and McNamee were handcuffed together and placed in one of the hacks along with Henderson and Megargee. Chew occupied the other, with two reporters as his guards, while the wagon, which was found to contain the bodies, of six stalwart negroes, was taken in charge by the two remaining pursuers. The load was driven to a Sanson street stable, while the three prisoners were conveyed to places of safety.
