The repeated discoveries of bogus diplomas are not entirely devoid of comfort A thing must have a value to make counterfeiting pay; nobody will take pains to forge a worthless name. Surely then the day is passing away when natural gifts are considered the highest claim to medical skill. But surely also the laws which permit so easily the establishment of such an institution need mending, or at least most careful watching in their execution.
