

Frequent impurities are found by microscopic investigations, to exist in the diamond. Organic matter, carbon and bubbles of gas are common impurities. Quartz, chlorite, pyrite and hematite have recently been discovered in diamonds, and small crystals of topaz

have also been seen. Paul Marcoy has described a leaf of the giant water lily (Victoria regia) found in Lake Nuna, Peru, as measuring 24 feet 91 inches in circumference, and weighing between 13 and 14 pounds.
