One of the most contemptible of the petty meannesses which the tariff seems to breed in swarms is the proposition, made by the superserviceable Custom house official on great lakes, to tax the extra quarter inch that is imported on one-inch lumber from Canada. The duty is \$2 per thousand feet of this thickness, and the officials are of opinion, look you, that somebody has been swindling the Government fearfully by sending over lumber an inch and a quarter in thickness. As this extra thickness is allowed merely for the purpose of being dressed off as shavings, leaving a board of just one inch in thickness, the natural conclusion is that the revenue officers have become victims of mistaken zeal. But a protective tariff leads to so many disreputable tricks and curious rulings by the Government employes that it is not safe to assume that this tax on refuse shavings will not have to be paid. Pine lumber is already so scarce in the United States that the Canadian lumbermen can compel

when the duty was paid by the exporter has already gone by, and Canadian officials will not be compelled to wait many years before they will be at liberty to add to the American tariff of two dollars per thousand an export duty of equal amount. By preventing the rapid denudation of Canadian forests, during the time of low prices, the American tariff on lumber has put miliions of dollars into the pockets of Canadian lumbermen, and millions more will follow unless there is a speedy repeal
