In an experiment by M. Paul Bert upon a live crocodile, the animal being made to forcibly close its mouth exerted a pulling force of 308 pounds upon a rope attached to the end of its upper jaw. The extremity of the jaw being the end of a long lever, the real power exerted by the muscles was much greater, and was computed to be 1540 pounds. This experiment was made upon a crocodile already weakened by cold and fatigue.

A schoolmaster of Nice has formed among his pupils a society for the protection of vegetation. The members are to destroy injurious larval and protect harmless birds. 
