"Jumbo."
NEW YORK, April 9.—"Jumbo," the largest elephant in captivity in the world, and for fifteen years past the pride of the London Zoological Gardens, was landed at New York from the steamer "Arya" on Monday, which left London, March 25. The announcement in the papers that "Jumbo" had arrived brought a large and curious crowd to the pier where the animal was landed at Pier One, preliminary to be taken up Broadway to Madison Square Garden. The strong wooden case in which Jumbo was confined, is fifteen feet in height. Scott, his keeper, said the first day of the voyage Jumbo had shown signs of discontent and on the second day refused to eat, but afterwards took regularly his 200 pounds weight of hay per day besides other food. Scott said he consulted the Baroness Bartlett-Coutts to see Jumbo, on board the steamer prior to his departure, and the Baroness sent a large present of bon-bons for the animal. Scott is to be paid \$5000 for the animal, which he received from Kensington Palace from the children of the Duke of Kent, relatives of the Queen, offering to supply Jumbo with all kinds of food and clothing.
Barnum is the man who was enterprising enough to buy "Jumbo" and bring him to America. Wonder how much he would give for our Chatham elephant? Scott, the Dominion Architect has had charge of our elephant since the Government bought it for \$10,000 and he says the first day after the purchase it showed signs of sickness, but thereafter it took regularly its food and has eaten \$5,000 worth, so that it now stands in the Dominion Menagerie accounts at a valuation of \$15,000.

The Dominion Election.
The best information we can get from Ottawa in reference to the prospects of a general election for the Dominion this summer is, that one is probable. Among the reasons assigned for a dissolution is the health of the Premier, which occasions his friends considerable anxiety. It is felt by the Government supporters that their prospects of success will be greater while Sir John is able to lead them, than at any other time, and that leads them to be much more willing to consent to a dissolution than they otherwise would be. But, as one correspondent says, "The only thing certain about the matter is that Sir John, if he is well enough, will do as he pleases whether the rank and file of his party like it or not."—Pictou Herald.
That Rupture.
There was considerable talk on Good Friday of a rupture in the ranks of the local Government. Mr. Adams, Surveyor General, was very much annoyed over the course taken by the Attorney General upon Mr. Butler's bill defining the duties of Constables, and being in a suitable frame of mind he was very free in his expressions of opinion in respect to the Government individually and collectively. It is said that he even went so far as to write out his resignation and hand it in; but whether this is the case or not, he talked resignation most violently. He has since been pacified. The most amusing thing about it was the indifference of his colleagues as to what course he should take. The fact of the matter is they would like to get rid of him, if they could without losing too much. They feel that he is a burden to carry through the Province, although a strong man in his own country. It is more than doubtful if he will remain in office after a new election under any circumstances.—Herald.
It is pretty generally known here that Mr. Adams is as weak at home as he is abroad. And it is quite certain that a new election will leave him little choice in reference to the matter of office.

While he was thus creeping along he was fired at by his neighbor, Mr. Joseph M. Mannus, who was also at goose hunting. A large quantity of shot poured into Mr. Otty's side, dangerously wounding him.
