

The Hon. Robert Marshall has set the Local Government an example which all its members would do well to follow. Mr. Marshall has, it is understood, tendered his resignation. It is true that Mr. Marshall did not secure a seat, but as the Government has not been able to get more than eight or nine supporters outside of themselves they may as well follow his example. Their efforts to reconstruct will not save them from their just fate. Mr. Marshall has been in public life over six years. It can be said for him that he was a most energetic and determined working member of the Legislature, and an approachable and accessible member of Government, ever ready to give information, and always wrestling with figures and statistics. He is a victim largely to his own friends. In the re-construction he should have insisted on the office of Provincial Secretary or the Board Works being given to him, and thus to the city. Instead of that he allowed an outside influence to re-construct the Government to his personal disadvantage,




