

An oriental writer has recently given an interesting description of an ancient burial in the Chinese empire. It was the custom for the wealthy man to procure his coffin when he had reached the age of forty. He would then have it painted three times a year with a composition resembling silicate paint or hard coating. The process of making this paint is now one of the lost arts of China. If the owner of the coffin lived long enough, the frequent paintingeach coat being of considerable thickness-caused it to assume the appearance of a sarcophagus, with a foot or more in thickness of this hard, stonelike shell. After death the veins and cavities of the person's stomach were filled with quicksilver for the purpose of preserving the body. A piece of jade would then be placed in each nostril and ear, and in one hand, while a the other hand. The body thus presilver within the coffin; the latter was sealed, and the whole deposited in its final resting-place. When some of these sarcophagi were opened after a lapse of centuries, the bodies were found to be perfectly preserved, but they quickly crumbled to dust on being exposed to the air.
