I will leave such speculations, however, to astronomers, my only object being to call your readers' attention to a sight which will amply repay them for the loss of few hours slumber, and which, I fancy, many have so far neglected because of not having fully realized that our celestial visitor is one of no ordinary size and On the 18th Sept., at 3 o'clock, p. m., when the first observation computed on

was made in Cincinnati, the comet was about 36,000,000 miles from the earth. and at the last observation in Cambridge. on Wednesday forenoon 27th 'ult., the listance from us was 32,500,000 miles. The distance from the sun at the first observation was 55,000,000 miles, and at the last 66,000,000. It will be nearest the earth during the present week. when it will come within a distance of 15,000,000 miles; then it will quickly disappear and be visible only in the southern hemisphere. As it approaches the earth and escapes the light of the sun's rays, which have the effect of neutralizing its brilliancy, it will be plainly visible until it reaches its mean distance from the earth. Heretofore it was not plainly visible to the naked eye only just before sunrise, but during the next week it may be looked for any clear day, and the nucleus and coma, with the wisps of the tail, will be discernible.
