I took the ground then, as a member of the Sessions, that accepting it would be like taking a white elephant for it would cost \$22,000 a year. The same year the Local Government presented a strong case to the Domi asking that a reasonable indemnity might be made; but it had no effect. In 1875, Sheriff Harding and I met the Government at Ottawa, and we made a report to the Sessions saying the Minister of Justice informed us that he would recommend that the institution be placed in such a position as would conserve to us our local rights. The whole thing, to my mind, is in a nut shell. At Confederation no valuation of the penitentiaries was taken, as a letter received by me from Sir John Macdonald clearly stated. In 1869 the Dominion Government introduced an act allowing short-term prisoners for a certain period to be sent to the penitentiary, and when the question came before the Supreme Court, the only question Mr. Lash allowed to be decided was if the Dominion Government had the right to legislate concerning penitentiaries, a theory any layman could have decided equally well. The proper question has not come before the Court yet, and I hold that the Dominion Government is liable to the Province and the Province to the city of St. John It was the opinion of Judge King, and is also the opinion of the present Attorney General, that prisoners convicted by statutes of the Dominion Parliament should be a charge on the Dominion. This i not a matter of civic concern, but a Provincial one, and the Government have been pressing the claim as earnestly as they possibly could. The people of St. John, in the interest of morality, are looking to a reformatory, but deem it impossible to take it up with this question pending, yet I hope the day is not far distant when the reformatory matter will be considered by the House of Assembly. As I do not wish to occupy too much of your time I will now bring my remarks to a close, and in doing so I may fairly assert that the condition of the Province is one on which we may fairly congratulate our selves, for New Brunswick, to-day, occupies as good a field, taking all the circumstances into consideration, as any of the pleted. other Provinces of Canada. Before I sit down, Mr. Speaker, allow me to thank you and the members of the House, for the attention that has been given me and for the courteous manner in which my remarks have been received.

The principle feature of the evening's session was the passage through its final stages of the Deceased Wife's Sister Bill, despite several attempts to amend or destroy it. Mr. Mills' motion to amend the bill so as to make the law uniform throughout the Dominion was lost by a vote of 51 to 106. A second amendment by Mr. Amyot to declare legal any mar riages that may be celebrated by the regular clergy was declared lost without recording the yeas and nays. Sir Albert market given in New Brunswick, owing to Smith then moved the six months hoist, which was negatived by the decisive vote of 113 yeas to 36 nays. After the amendment had been concurred in a final attack was made upon the bill as amended by Dr. Strange, who moved an amendment to provide for legalising marriage to a widow with the brother of a deceased husband. 
