He has made money there already, and thererfore will wish to stop to make more, and though I believe he would find himself entirely deserted as soon as Cetewayo entered the country, he may have the power, if he is not carefully dealt with, of creating awkward and undesirable disturbances. He is, in fact, an enemy for whom a bridge may be built with advantage. As regards the other kinglets, they hold their places by a species of constitution conferred on the country by a conquering power, and they cannot be deprived of their position except by some voluntary agreement. If they could be induced to appear in the light of welcomers of the excited monarch I should have little fear for the future. Though it must be borne in mind that those who have once been chiefs will always be in danger of being suspected of wishing to be chiefs once more, and that though Cetewayo himself may be magnanimous enough not to take notice of such suspicions, his relatives may be less well disposed. As regards the King's property this is the matter which must be cattle have passed into the hands of all sorts of persons, and it must be seen that there is no room left for such persons to suffer. Then there is the question as to how the restoration is to be brought about. "Oh, brethren," said he, "I can speak feelingly, experimentally on this point; and I stand before you seasonably to-day as alive from the dead, if I may hope to impress it upon you, and induce you to prepare for that solemn hour which must come to all, by a timely acquaintance with, appreciation of, and a dependence on the death of Christ." Many tearful eyes witnessed the distribution of the sacred elements, as given out by one who was already standing with one foot in the grave. Having given, with his dying breath, a last adieu to his surrounding flock, he retired to his chamber fully aware of his near approach to the end of time. As the evening of the sad day gathered its darkness, he handed to a near and dear relative this immortal hymn, with music accompanying, which he had

Abide with me; fast falls the eventide; The darkness deepens; Lord, with me abide: When other helpers fail, and comforts flee, Help of the helpless, O abide with me.

Swift to its close ebbs out life's little day; Earth's joys grow dim, its glories pass away. Change and decay on all around I see;

Oatmeal Porridge. Clean, aromatic, coarse dry meal must be got from some shop where they know what is good in the way of oatmeal. The meal must be stored as carefully as tea in a covered dry jar, so that neither mice nor beetles can defile it. The saucepan must be the pink of cleanliness, and must not have been used for anything other than milk and breadstuffs. Saucepans in which potatoes, greens or meats have been cooked are never pure enough for milk and breadstuffs. With such materials the making of delicious porridge is easy, but without them it is impossible. Rearing in mind the principle on which breadstuffs are to be combined in food we perceive that the meal must be cooked in water. Therefore, having clean boiling water in the sucepan, we take a small teacupful of meal (two or three ounces) for each pint of water in the saucepan Draw the saucepan of boiling water off the fire, and then sift in the meal through the most carefully attended to. The royal fingers. The meal must be sifted into the water so as to be evenly spread over the surface and to sink free from lumps. Then push the saucepan fully on the fire and boil briskly for a minute or two, so as to thoroughly mix the meal up with the water before it begins to thicken. Next boil slowly for three or four quarters of an hour, according to the coarseness of the meal. Care must be taken that the porridge is just kept on the move, and it must be stirred, if necessary, so as not to burn or get lumpy. The porridge is now cooked so far that all the starch granules are fully burst, and the meal is properly disintergated. Now pour out the porridge like a thin custard into a vegetable dish, and leave it to cool uncovered. If success may still be risk, Cetewayo's restoration ful, the porridge on cooling will set or gelantinize; a brownish skin forms on the surface, and as this contracts the porridge separates all round from the dish at its edge. It becomes a soft, tremulous jelly, perfectly cooked, sweet in flavor, uniform in consistence, and free from contamina. tions by dirty saucepans, by burning, or by the defilement of soot or smoke .-It should be eaten at the end of breakfast with cold milk, and makes a most excellent supper. A saucerful of such porridge put into a soup plate, and a half pint mug of good new rich milk is, indeed, a lunch or a supper. or a finish to breakfast, which is fit for a king.
