It is not necessary in this age of the world for the farmer to rise in the middle of the night and begin his work. The getting up so early in the morning is a relic of barbarism. It has made hundreds of thousands of young men curse the business. There is no need of getting up at three or four o'clock in the winter morning. The farmer who persists in dragging his wife and children from their beds ought to be visited by a missionary. It is time enough to rise after the sun has set the example. In the old times they used to get up about three o'clock in the morning, and go to work long before the sun had risen with 'healing upon his wings' and, as a just punishment, they all had the ague; and they ought to have it now. When you rise at four and work till dark, what is life worth? Of what use is all the improved machinery unless it tends to give the farmer a little more leisure? 
