A Grand Manan correspondent of the News gives a fuller account than any yet printed of a mysterious wreck on the Old by the wheels of a one-horse vehicle | Proprietor Ledge, and says :-

While fishing near the Old Proprietor Ledge last Wednesday, the men saw near the rock what looked like three poles with their tops a short distance above the surface of the water. On rowing up they found the three poles to be the topmasts of a large square-rigged vessel, but whether a ship or a barque they were not able to tell. They brought away with them a piece of wire rigging sixty feet long, evidently a jib stay. The vessel has evidently lain there some weeks as sea weed has begun to form on the masts. A number of boats have since been to the spot, but nothing has been found to show position it is thought she was inward

The Old Proprietor is a dangerous rock some six or seven miles to the southeast of Grand Manan, and about the same distance to the east of Gannet Rock. In 1876 the Dominion Government placed a spindle and ball upon the rock. This is of some service in clear weather but of no use in the fog. In the spring of 1877 the spindle was found to be bent, probably by some outward bound vessel. The same spring part of the side of a fishing vessel came ashore on Southwest Head. A Gloucester vessel, which sailed from North Head that winter was never after heard from, and it is thought by many that she struck upon this rock. The top of the rock is bare for about two hours each tide.
