Coun. Anthony Adams said he was one of the Committee appointed to make the division in 1878. They then took the Valuators' List for 1876 and found it taken for the whole Parish. He now objected that the Committee could not get the valuation from the Valuators' List of 1876, as the Committee of which he was one in 1878 took it from the Assessors' List, as that was divided for each half of the Parish, and the Valuators' List was not. As they took the Valuators' List for 1876, it made a difference of \$15,000 against Northesk, which was unjust as they could not

parties resided. Coun. Burchill explained that the Committee had no interest in the matter, and no wish to do anything unfair to Northesk, The resolution of Coup. Tozer, in relation to the matter, stated that the Valuators' List of 1876 was to be taken. There was a difference according to the Assessors' List of 1879 of \$25,000, and Coun. Ryan had objected on the ground that Coun. Tozer's resolution referred to the Valuators' List of 1876. They added up the List and found a difference of \$37,700 between Northesk and Southesk as now constituted, and had to work their valua-North and Southesk and to report at this tion from that, and he thought they had done so equitably.

Coun. Tozer denied that the Committee in 1878 had taken their valuation from the Assessors' List, as it was "lumped." In 1879, by Act of Assembly, the Parish of Northesk was divided into two parishes, and the Act dividing the Parish empowered the County Council, at its first Session after the law came in force, to appoint a Committee to divide the liabilities of the Parishes of Northesk and Southesk, taking the valuation of 1876 as a basis. In 1880, when the Committee made an examination, they found Northesk owed on Almshouse Account, \$130, but they estimated Northesk at a proportion of \$70 and contingent and school tunds were Southesk at \$60 in the \$130, which he contended was not the true valuation, as the law required that of 1876. When the Secretary Treas. made the apportionment of the Contingent and School Funds, he made it equal on the two parishes, and for that reason Northesk returned Southesk
