not guilty?" With equal distinctness came the reply, "GUILTY AS INDICTED" Then the pent up feelings of the crowd found expression in an uproarious demon-

stration of applause and approval. "Order" shouted the bailiffs. Scovllle and the counsel for the prosecution were simultaneously upon their feet. Scoville attempted to address the court, but the District Attorney shouted, "Wait till we have the verdict complete and in due form of law." Order was at length restored, and the clerk, addressing the jury, said: "Your foreman says guilty as indicted so say you all?" "We do," they all re sponded. Another demonstration of ap proval followed this announcement. bu not so long as the first. Scoville, sti upon his feet, demanded a poll of the jury, which was granted, and each juror was called by name and each in a firm voice promptly responded "Guilty." As the last name was called

THE PRISONER SHRIEKED, "My blood will be upon the heads of that jury ; don't you forget it." Scoville again addressed the Court, saying: "Your Honor, I do not wish to forfeit any rights I may have under the law and practice in along at least once a week on time. this district. If there is anything I ought to do now to save those rights, I would be indebted to Your Honor to indicate it to me." Judge Cox, in reply, assured him he should have every opportunity; that the charge would be furnished in print tomorrow, and he would be accorded all the time allowed by law within which to filexceptions, and would also be entitled to four days within which to move in arrest of judgment. Guiteau (who from the mo ment the Judge began the delivery of hi charge, had dropped completely his air of flippant arrogance and sat with rigid fea tures and compressed lips) called out in tones of desperation: God will avenge this outrage !" Judge Cox then turned t the jury and said: "Gentlemen of the jury:- I cannot express too many thanks for the manner in which you have discharged your duty. You have richly merited the thanks of your countrymens and I feel assured you will take with you to your homes the approval of your consciences. With thanks, gentlemen of the jury, I dismiss you." With this announcement the Court was

declared adjourned. The crowd quickly left the room and the prisoner, gesticu lating with manacled hands, was led out As he passed the reporters' table he leaned over and called to acquaintances Court in banc will reverse this business." His appearance was that of a man deeply moved with indignation at some outrage or indignity which had been put upon him. While being put in the van, the crowd upon the pavement yelled and shouted themselves hoarse in mockery of the prisoner's constant boast, "The American press and people are all with me."
