

### Loss of H. M. SS. Phonix.

The British Warships Northampton and Phænix, left Gaspe on the morning of the 12th for Halifax, but during the day parted company in a gale and were not in sight of each other by sunset. The former arrived safely at Halifax but the fortunes of the latter were different. About 9 o'clock she had sighted East Point Light, but owing to the night being thick, her commander imagined it was a different light, and keeping towards it. the ship struck and at the same instant a heavy sea broke over her, with loss of her propeller and stern post almost immediately afterwards. On Wednesday morning the crew landed, and found shelter in a lobster canning shed, and on Thursday morning, after the sea had gone down, they landed all the light stuff. The Phænix was commissioned 20th April 1880 at Davenport to be stationed on the North ..... 128 53 American coast. She was a wood-built screw steamer, of 1130 tons and was armed with six four ton cannon and one Gatling gun. The first news of the wreck came via Halifax, whither the commander had telegraphed to the admiral's ship, the Northampton. The Phanix is a total wreck, with no prospect of being got off

the reef where she lies. A later despatch says,-H. M. S. Foam arrived at Halifax on Thursday evening from the scene of the wreck of H. M. warship Phanix. The stranded man of-war, when the "Foam" left on Tuesday, was in the same condition as before reportedbilged and full of water. Her crew, who since the ship went ashore had been living in a lobster factory near by, were several days ago taken on board the flagship "Northampton," where preparations had previously been made for their accommodation. Three guns were saved from the wreck and three remained on board at the time the "Foam" started for Halifax, but all would likely be got out. A large quantity of material was saved, and work will be continued for several days longer. The commander of the "Phænix" will be
