BLACKBERRY AND APPLE PUDDING .-Take four ounces of beef suet chopped very fine; put this into a basin, and rub thoroughly into it six ounces of flour and a teaspoonful of salt, then make a hol in the centre, and with the yolk of an egg well beaten and diluted with water, mix into a soft dough. Sprinkle the paste board with flour, and roll the dough out to about a quarter of an inch thick. Butter a pudding dish, and line it with paste, cutting it round about half an inch beyond the rim of the dish. Fill it up with blackberries, apples peeled, cored, and cut into small pieces, and moist sugar alternately; sprinkle it throughout with the grated rind of a lemon. Pour about half a teaspoonful of water into it, and cover the top with paste, pressing the edges together all round to close it well. Tie over with a cloth and boil it for one hour and a half taking care that the water is boiling when the pudding is put in, and that it continues to do so to the end. Turn out of the st. John, N.B dish and serve.
