MONDAY, 24TH.

Ragheb Bey, second officer of the em. bargoed mail steamer, has been arrested. Documents were found upon him showing that for months he has acted as agent for Arabi for carrying communications between him and the Palace and the Pan Islamic committee at Constantinople Ragheb was taken before the tribunal and upon being promised leniency if he fully confessed gave a complete list of persons with whom Arabi was connected. The list includes several influential persons at Constantinople. Ragheb also gave a list of Arabi's confederates in Egypt. A cipher letter to Arabi was found upon him.

An eye witness from Tartah states that 85 Europeans were tortured, disemboweled and torn to pieces, and that women were violated and tortured, soldiers participating in the atrocities.

Arabi Pacha's new Government has issued a proclamation stating that every native molesting Christians will be shot. It is believed that this is a mere form to cover themselves, should they hereafter fall into our hands.

The News' despatch from Port Said says : De Lesseps arrived here on Saturday, accompanied by the aide de-camp of the Khedive. Seventeen war vessels of different nations are in the harbor ; five English men-of-war under Rear Admiral Hoskins, and five French under Admiral Conrad. The latter have consented to assist the English in keeping order in the town and protecting the lives and property of Europeans. In event of an outbreak the French are prepared to land 600 men, the English

Hoskins has written to the English Consul at Cairo urging him to impress upon British subjects the necessity of leaving Egypt at once.

For the sake of uniformity, as well as in compliance with trade principles recognised by every enlightened Government, the Department should be held to its pre-election promise that the salmon net tax was to be abolished. is true that the promise was only made use of quietly and in certain out-of-theway localities, but as it has been brought out into noon-day light let, there be a general demand that it be adhered to and carried into practical effect. 
