THE METROPOLITAN QUESTION.--The question of whether Montreal has the right to be the Metropolitan See of the Anglican Church in Canada was finally settled, so far as the Church itself can settle it, by the vote taken in the Provincial Synod on Tuesday evening. By an overwhelming majority it was decided that no provisions of letters patent should be allowed to interfere with the right of the Church to elect its own Metropolitan. The diversity of opinion on the subject among legal men has hitherto been very great; but the argument submitted to the Synod by the Chief Justice Allen, in opposition to the claims of Montreal, was admitted by all who heard it, and in the Synod were many of the leading lawyers of the Dominion, to be most luminous, exhaustive and convincing, and practically to set the question at rest for ever. The argument of the Chief Justice was ably supported by C. W. Waldron, M. P., Judge Wilkinson and Mr. Hodgson, of Charlottetown, among the Maritime members of the Synod, as well as by prominent lawyers from the Upper Provinces. The decision arrived at confirms the perfect freedom of the Church in Canada to deal with all questions of self-government, untrammelled by any vestige of previous State connection.--Capital.

Details of a shocking domestic tragedy have been received from Vienna. The victims were Frau O'Briss, the wife of a glider, and her two sons and two daughters, whose ages ranged from ten to eighteen. On the room they occupied being entered all five were discovered to be dead from the effects of poison. The cause of this painful event is that the furniture of the family was to have been distrained upon. The husband, who was formerly a comparatively wealthy man, but who has gradually fallen into poverty, arrived home, but failed to make any one hear his repeated knocking. Thinking his family asleep, and fearing to disturb them, he left and passed the night at a hotel. THE METROPOLITAN QUESTION.--The question of whether Montreal has the right to be the Metropolitan See of the Anglican Church in Canada was finally settled, so far as the Church itself can settle it, by the vote taken in the Provincial Synod on Tuesday evening. By an overwhelming majority it was decided that no provisions of letters patent should be allowed to interfere with the right of the Church to elect its own Metropolitan. The diversity of opinion on the subject among legal men has hitherto been very great; but the argument submitted to the Synod by the Chief Justice Allen, in opposition to the claims of Montreal, was admitted by all who heard it, and in the Synod were many of the leading lawyers of the Dominion, to be most luminous, exhaustive and convincing, and practically to set the question at rest for ever. The argument of the Chief Justice was ably supported by C. W. Waldron, M. P., Judge Wilkinson and Mr. Hodgson, of Charlottetown, among the Maritime members of the Synod, as well as by prominent lawyers from the Upper Provinces. The decision arrived at confirms the perfect freedom of the Church in Canada to deal with all questions of self-government, untrammelled by any vestige of previous State connection.--Capital.

Details of a shocking domestic tragedy have been received from Vienna. The victims were Frau O'Briss, the wife of a glider, and her two sons and two daughters, whose ages ranged from ten to eighteen.
