HATHAM. - - - - APRIL 19, 1883 How Clothes-Pins are Made.

A writer in an American contemporary

thus describes a clothes-pin factory :- The process of making the pins is a very interesting one. The wood used is mainly white birch and beech. The logs are cut and hauled to the shores of the lake or streams emptying into it, whence they are floated down to the mill. As fast as required they are hauled into the mill by a windlass and chain, worked by steam power, and sawed into lengths of sixteen or twenty two inches, the former to be made into pins, and the latter into boards for the boxes required in packing.
