

Brooklyn at about 4 p. m. on Wednesday of last week. The structure was well filled with pedestrians at that hour, although, contrary to first reports of the calamity, it was not crowded to its full capacity.

A Great Calamity.

PHYSICIAN AND SURGEON, A woman who was ascening the lower flight of steps stumbled and fell on the landing. The crowd pressed upon her, and she shrieked, when the bridge officer, Frederick Richards, who was on the plank walk above, seeing her danger, elbowed his way to the steps and lifted her up. The crowd closed upon them both, and they went down. With a desperate effort Officer Richards got upon his feet once more, dragging the woman after him. She screamed again in despair and fright. and the crowd above and below pressed toward the spot to discover the cause of the commotion. The crush immediately became fearful: those on the approach below the stairs were carried forward in a solid mass, and many stumbled and were unable to resist the pressure from behind. The crowd passed over them. From above the crowd coming from Brooklyn was carried to the edge of the steps and then

> mass below. A terrible struggle for life then began. Men and women fought with the strength of despair against each other, and escape was impossible; with the pressure from both sides growing at every shout of anguish that went up from the dying and those who saw death before their eyes. Fear and despair on one side, and curiosity on the other fought for mastery. The frightful crush grew denser, when after nearly fifteen minutes a score of militiamen of the 12th Regiment, led by Lieut. Hart and Sergeants Couldock and Costello marched up the approach towards Brooklyn, and the yells of the crowd attracted their attention. At the foot of the steps a wall of human bodies was piled up four feet high, a dense mass surged about its and in it the soldiers saw two policemen vainly struggling against the press. Sergeant Couldock took in the situation at a

At his word of command his men scale the fence and the railroad track separating them from the footwalk, and wedging into the mass of people near the scene of the disaster, drove back the crowd at the New York entrance at the muzzle of their guns. The crowd fell back slightly, and the militiamen following up the advantage gained, forced it back until the approach was cleared; then, forming a front across the footwalk, they prevented the crowd from passing back, while as many of their number as could be spared ran toward to the scene of the accident to help in extricating the dead and saving the living. The alarm had meanwhile been given at

the hospital ambulances, and policemen was hurried over upon the bridge. From their stations beside the City Hall the firemen of the hook and ladder company followed to assist. They found the situation still unaltered. On the bridge the crowd on the footwalk above the steps was constantly receiving accessions, and still pressing on and over the heap on the anchorage. The bodies of the dead and dying lay here so firmly wedged together that to extricate them was next to impossible. To beat back the crowd was equally impossible, and relief was possible only by making room for the crowd to spread sideways. It was quickly done, and willing hands tore away the iron railing dividing the footway from the railroad track ou both sides and dragged those who were nearest in the crush through the opening. Room was thus made for the policemen to reach the frightful heap of human beings, and the work of clearing it away began. As soon as a portion of the obstruction was removed from the steps

crush holding her screaming baby above was said that the man harbeen seen carrying the dead baby away out the police had no account of it. Baby clothing scattered about gave evidence enough that weak infants had been in the crush. The woman whom Bridge Officer Richards had helped to her feet at the beginning of the crush was saved. Richards also escaped death by desperate efforts. In speaking of the occurrence afterwards he said there was no chance of restoring order from the first. That one first scream was the death-knell of many in that crowd. It grew at once utterly ungovernable, and so dense that a movement of any kind was utterly impossible. The crowd, forced by the constant pressure and accession from the Brooklyn side, went over the steps like a cataract and, once started, fell until the walk lay piled with bodies to the height of the steps, when they went over and fell down beyond it. the downstream of the waggonway. Apparently no measures were taken at the Brooklyn end to stop travel for at least a considerable time. On the Brooklyn approach this travel was also diverted from the footway and turned into the waggon road. Instead of decreasing, however, it grew constantly as rumors of the disaster began to fly through Brooklyn. Rumor had it that the bridge had fallen and that hundreds had been crushed to death. In the excitement of the crush Wm. Oxford, aged 45, a drunken man, deliberately jumped from the bridge and was

fatally injured. The place on the bridge where the accident occurred is the danger spot in the structure. To persons who are looking out over the scenery as they pass either way it is a most perilous trap.

At midnight the casualty list embraced New York despatches give particulars 12 dead-11 of whom had been identified of a dreadful calamity, which took place and 26 injured, some fatally, some badon the new bridge between that city and ly, and others slightly. Many of the wounded and perhaps some of the dead were driven straight to their homes. Of these the police had no account.

> One account of the disaster says a half dozen roughs bunched themselves 300 feet above stairs, laid their hands on each other's shoulders and forced themselves like wedges into the crowd, shouting"this association can make its way through anything." The crowd seemed to have a horror of going up the steps, although the flight is only six feet high. They locked arms and pushed furiously against thousands coming from Brooklyn. In a few minutes there was a slow yielding to the frightful pressure, and the front of the crowd was forced near to the edge. Women and children were screaming for help, and men were shouting. Umbrellas and canes were thrown over the rails by people who madly began to fight their way out of the crush. At last with a shriek. a young girl lost her footing, and fell down the lower flight of steps. She raised herself on her hands and would have got up, but in a moment she was buried under the bodies of others who fell over her. A man sprang upon the rails and waved the crowd back from New York and Brooklyn, but people continued to crowd on. The bridge policemen do not wear uniforms and were not recognized as officers in the crowd. Those on the outer edge of the crowd clutched desperately at the railing, but the tremendous pressure tore them loose and swept them on with bleeding hands towards the next

Girls shrieked themselves into hysterics. One old man plied his cane vigorously on all sides. A drunken woman scratched and bit like a frenzied cat at every face and arm within reach. A little girl. crushed between two laborers, was by their combined strength lifted and held up senseless and bleeding at the nose and mouth. From every throat came frantic shrieks of terror and agony, which added to the excitement and made the danger worse. Several who attempted to climb upon or cling to the railing had arms or legs broken, a woman who got upon the rail fainted, and would have fallen to the street had not two men caught her by the ankles and lowered her to a beam, where they held her until assistance came. First to be lifted out of the mass of crushed and bleeding humanity was a boy ten years of age. His face had been trampled to pulp A young woman almost nude was laid on the drive and died almost instantly. A man about 35, was next. A young woman with broken rib protruding through her

breast was carried across the track. Vigorous efforts were made to resuscitate those who seemed to be lifeless. Ice water was brought from the New York entrance and tho doctors in the crowd volunteered their services.
