New Altar.

A handsome new altar was recently placed in position in St. Michael's Pro-Cathedral, Chatham, and used for th first time on Sunday, 15th inst. It Gothic in design. Starting from a broad base, which runs the length of the front of the altar, are four clusters of columns which divide the front into three panels, PIENIC AND BAZAAR. -- The R. Catholics | each cluster having square bases and carved capitals, which support the altar table and the moulding underneath. The panels, in front and on the ends, are covered with Gothic tracery and chamfered crisps with the monogram, I. H. S. in the centre of the centre panel.

The Tabernacle is supported on corners by buttresses. The door of th Tabernacle forms a Gothic arch supported by two pillars. Above the Tabernagle is a circular niche and on each side are the grades, the front of which are panelled Above the grades are three Gothic panels. Above each of these panels is a pediment the peak of which stands above the altar five or six inches. At the foot each of the pediments connect and rest on carved boss. Up each side is a row of the Gothic cross which surmounts each forget. pediment. The Tabernacle finishes with a pediment and stands out from the face of the altar about eight inches, and is finished in the same manner as those on each side and is surmounted by a cross

which stands about a foot on each side The design is a modification of one the side altars of the future Cathedral. It was built by Mr. Patrick Connors under the direction of Rev. T. J. Bannon the acting Chancellor of the Diocese, and is a most creditable piece of workmanship.






