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ing. She took water in fine style and presented a very handsome appearance. Her dimensions are 94 feet keel, 18 feet beam and 47 ft. hold. The boiler is a two flue return tubular one, 10 ft. 7 in. long and 7 ft. 6 in. diameter. It was built at the Miramichi Foundry by Mr. Joseph Robinson. The engine is of the compound principle and was built at Mr. Snowball's machine shop, by Mr. Robert McGuire, who was also general superintendent of the whole. Mr. Patrick Desmond being master builder of the steamer. The cylinders of the engine are respectively, of 18 and 32 inches diameter and 15 inches stroke, and are fitted with brass condenser. The hull is of juniper, with bottom planking of birch - all galvanized fastenings and butt-bits of copper. The shaft is of steel, with solid crank and pin in fact, the best of the best material and most thorough construction and will be an efficient addition to the steam tug fleet of the Miramichi.

Lighthouse Building. The contractor for the lighthouse at Point Peter, Gaspé, Mr. Jas. Desmond, has been busy all winter on his work and left Chatham on Saturday last on the steamer Clarendon, Capt.
