B. A. Book and Tract Society.

ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting of the British

American Book and Tract Society

was held at Halifax on the 5th and was

well attended.

The Secretary presented the report

of the past year's work, from which the following

extracts are made:

The donations for the year amount to

\$5,358.16, as compared with \$3,401.53

in 1882. This increase has led the com-

mittee to increase the staff of collectors to

thirty men, to be located as follows:

Eleven in Nova Scotia, twelve in

New Brunswick, three in Cape Breton, two

in Prince Edward Island, and two in New-

foundland.

SUMMARY OF COLLECTAGE IN 1882.

Twenty-six men have been at work in

the Provinces for some portion of the year.

Their united services equal that of one

man for twelve and one fourth years.

Miles travelled aggregate 20,841. Sales

amounted to \$13,332.56. Grants to the

field, \$913.85. Religious meetings par-

ticipated in by collectors number 625.

Protestant families have found destitute of

God's Word and supplied, reach the sur-

prising number of 205.

FINANCIAL ASPECT OF THE YEAR.

In 1881 the volume of receipts from all

sources was \$20,761.18; in the past year

the Treasurer's statement shows a total of

\$31,517.88. The increase is principally

due to bequests, increased donations and

collector's sales.

Gen'l's Andrew Jackson, G. T. Beau-

regard and Jubal A. Early.

The military chiefs above named were

brought in strange contact a few

days ago at New Orleans, La., on the 9th

of January, 1883, when the 182d Grand

Monthly Drawing of the Louisiana State

Lottery took place, immediately after the

anniversary of the Battle of New Orleans,

known there as St. Andrew Jackson's day,

and is observed as a general holiday.

Gen'l's Beauregard and Early had (as they

always do) the entire management of the

distribution of \$265,500 in prizes, and here

is what they did with it: Ticket No.

10,454, sold for \$5 to Alvin Kensler, of

Missis. La. Fayette county, Mo., drew

\$75,000. Ticket No. 8,586 drew \$25,000

—sold in Fayette. (For \$1 each)—\$5,000

to Augustine Lopez, of New Orleans; \$5,

another \$5,000 to T. Tagliapietra, 123 Conti

st., both of New Orleans. Among others,

the third prize of \$10,000, won by

ticket No. 86,401, sold in fits in New

York city. Tickets No. 22,285 and 70,

755, drawing each \$6,000, were sold in

fifties—two to B. Apple, of Omaha,

Neb., one collected through the Union

and Planters Bank of Memphis, Tenn.;

one to J. B. Ketchum, No. 632 Broadway,

New York city, one to H. E. Stevens, of

Titusville, Pa. Tickets Nos. 23,260,

23,623, 29,950, 78,616, 83,672, each drew

\$2,000, scattered over the country. Next
