Council here adjourned until five o'clock to allow the several committees to get through with their work. Council having been again opened at 5 o'clock it was, on motion, adjourned till 11 o'clock, next morning.

WEDNESDAY, JAN 17TH. Council met this morning at 10 o'clock and on motion was adjourned till one o'clock, p. m., to allow the several committees further time to complete their work.

Council resumed at one o'clock, p. m. LEAVE OF ABSENCE--PETITION. Coun. McNaughton asked for leave of absence to attend a funeral in Chatham, which request was, on motion, granted, after which the Council was adjourned till 2 o'clock, p. m., at which time it again met.

Coun. Cameron read a petition from Sarah A. Fairley, Executrix of the estate of the late John Fairley, complaining that she had been over assessed on property in the Parish of Ludlow, and praying for redress. The Warden asked the Sec. Treas. if the petition should not be sworn to, and was informed that it should. The matter was therefore deferred.

SALE OF PUBLIC LANDS. The Sec. Treas. read a report showing that he had caused the lot of County lands situated in the town of Newcastle, known as the Shaw Lot, to be sold at public auction conformable with a resolution passed at the last July sitting of the Council, and that the said lot had been sold to Samuel Thomson for the sum of \$800 payable according to the terms of the said resolution.

Moved by Coun. Adams, seconded by Coun. Ryan that the report be received and adopted. Carried. On motion it was ordered that the Warden execute a deed of the land to the said Samuel Thomson on his complying with the terms of sale.

TABUSINTAC BOOM. Coun. Stewart read a petition from Michael Graham asking that a fee of 5c per M. be allowed to be charged on lumber passing through Tabusintac boom. Coun. Stewart said the boom was erected by private parties and that there were four or five million feet of lumber passing through it each year, and parties who had not contributed anything towards building it derived the same benefit as those who had, and, therefore, should pay a fee on their lumber.

Moved by Coun. Adams, seconded by Coun. Stewart that a committee of three be appointed to prepare by-laws for the regulation of the boom, which, on being put to the meeting was carried. Couns. Stewart, Adams and Loggie were appointed as such committee.

WARFAGE. Coun. Fish called attention of the Council to the fact that the wharfage on vessels was unfair to some while it was more than fair to others. A wooden vessel of 500 tons pays, altogether, about \$43.00 while the charges on iron and wooden vessels of 1200 tons amounted to only about \$12.00.

Coun. Loggie had inquired into this matter and had concluded that the by-laws in regard to wharfage were not equitable. He said that vessels lying 200 feet at wharves only paid one-half as much as those lying first. The dues should be the same in one case as in the other, and he would therefore move that "all vessels coming into port over 500 tons pay 1 cent per ton per day as wharfage."
