September 10th, 1883. To the Editor of the Miramichi Advance DEAR SIR, -A few days ago I visited a neighbor's house and I there saw in a late copy of the World, a letter from a correspondent who, it seems, has been visiting

the trout streams of Hardwicke. If from any one we might expect the truth it ought to be from "Tourist," but what he has written in the World is not the truth, so far as regards the alleged unlawful fishing done by the inhabitants of Eel River. "Tourist" says that barrels of trout have been salted this season, caught with nets by the residents of Eel River. This is false and I am sorry that "Tourist" has made such a statement in the columns of a public journal, as, holding the position that he does, he brings discredit on his holy calling when he states the injury in his power. He says, we what he cannot prove.

So far as Eel River is concerned, there is not any unlawful fishing done by the inhabitants. "Tourist" goes even further than saying the inhabitants of Hardwicke are not a law-abiding people. He charges one Overseer of Fisheries with allowing unlawful fishing, and the other one with being an easy-going old chap.

One of the Overseers says that "Tourist" use of words which the Rev. correspondent says he did.
