Lord Lyttleton, who has made considerable research into these matters, refers to the ill-lund f "thirteen at table" to the last supp at which that number sat down. The Germans derive the superstition from the Northern mythology. Of the Gods who sat down to the feast with Loki, in the Wallahalla, Baldur had to die-because he was the thirteenth. In Dantzic, the principal seaport, and one of the oldest cities in Prussia, there is a curious clock which at twelve admits through the door little effigies of Christ and the eleven. shutting out Judas, the betrayer, who is the thirteenth. He, however, is admitted at 1 o'clock.

The Romans regarded thirteen as an unlucky number. The Russians have the same prejudices, and, as evidenced by a couple of entries in the diary of Thomas Moore, the poet, these dislikes are general, even among the middle classes of the British Islands.

Philosophically considered, there is something in this prejudice against thirteen at table. Of thirteen persons of different ages, anywhere assembled, there must always be a probability that one, at least, will die within the year. This is a so true of twelve, but the probability is
