



The Governor-Generalship of Canada.

Toronto Globe anent the Governor Generalship, contains the following:-In the Imperial House of Commons Mr. Gladstone refused this afternoon to reply to Baron Worms' question respecting the desire of the Duke of Albany to hold the post of Governor General of the Dominion, stating among other reasons that the question raised points of a delicate nature undesirable to bring under discussion. The opinion is still prevalent that in addition to objections raised by the Ministry, difficulties existed in other quarters. The in October.

Mr. Gladstone to give the facts connected with the Duke of Albany's Canadian offer caused much comment, and is regarded as significant as to the conditions of the Queen's health. It is said to have been directly at the request of the Queen that the Ministry refused to discuss the matter, as it was at her command the Premier declined to accept the Duke of Albany's proferred services. Her Majesty recognizes the precarious condition of her health, and does not wish any of her children to leave the country at present. The Marquis of Lorne would like to remain in Canada SALT. another year, but the Queen would not permit, and Princess Louise would have been recalled to England permanently early this spring, had it not been that such excuse would have been misunderstood and misconstrued. The Queen's health affects the detail of Government matters in many respects, and since her fall from the stairway with the nervous troubles that followed, and the effect of the death of John Brown, the Ministry and those who personally surround the Queen have had frequent cause of anxiety. Hence such action as that of Mr. Gladstone to-day in turn causes some popular anxiety.

Political Honors in China.

In order to secure even the first-fruits of political emelument, a mode of procedure diametrically opposite to that which obtains in most nations, (and especially in the United States), is required. Instead of money or its equivalent in "backers" and "heelers," brain is there required, and an exceedingly well-balanced and disciplined brain at that. In no other nation upon the earth are political honors based upon scientific attainments in all branches of study as they are in China, wherein are illustrated the true principles by which talent and wisdom are honored and warded, literature, science, morals, and philosophy encouraged, and a nation's happiness and prosperity secured.

The avenues to station and power are open alike to all. There are no distinctions save those of education; none relative to nationality, color, or previous condition of servitude. All are alike free to seek, and, if competent, to obtain, positions of honor, from that of petty magistracte of a village to Grand Imperial Secretary-an office second only to that of Em-

One of the largest and most complete barns in the Maritime Provinces is now being built by Mr. Charles 'Fawcett, Sackville, N. B., who, by recent purchases, has increased his farm to 150 acres of upland and 100 of marsh, and intends to devote considerable attention to live stock. The barn, which is a side hill one, is 112 x 50 feet, with 21 feet posts and will contain a cellar 8 feet high, with cemented floor under the whole. The cellar will contain the manure and be used for the storage of roots. The main floor will contain large rooms for grain and other feed, agricultural implements, and room for 90 oxen. Cut feed and roots will be carried along before the cattle by a hand rail-car, and water will be supplied to the cattle in the barn. The feed boxes will be movable, so as to be easily cleaned. The building is to be thoroughly ventilated. An adjoining building will contain a steam
