



After a coroner's jury had failed to arrive at a decision as to the cause of the terrible affair, it was stated in the press that the employees of the Intercolonial Railway -the Engineer, Brakeman and Fireman-were drunk when they left Bathurst and that the Conductor's van had been reported as "a little hell" by a man who had been in it just before the collision.
