The Newall House, Milwaukee, was burned on Wednesday night of last week. It was a six-story structure with an attic story, the latter being fitted up to accommodate some of the servants. The fire broke out in the south end of the huge building and spread with great rapidity. In a few minutes more than a dozen persons must have lost their lives amid the confusion and smoke which filled the corridors: Half stifled persons were lying across the hallways, while the shrieks of women and the groans of men were heard above the din. 


